General Operating Budget

Primary budget for most City services

Capital Budget

- 1-year budget
- Planning for 4 future years

Other Budgets

Sewer System, Economic Development

Types of Budgets (continued)

Operating Budget pays for:

- Salaries
- Health Care
- Fuel
- Office Supplies
- Training
- Insurance

Capital Budget pays for:

- Road Paving
- Sidewalks and Greenways
- Parks & Playgrounds
- Infrastructure
- Economic Development Projects





FY24: Budget Focus Areas

ONE CHATTANOGA

 Last year we formulated a bold, actionable budget for implementing the One Chattanooga plan

 This year, we're continuing that work, with a focus on the things that matter most to Chattanoogans

Affordable Housing and Homelessness Reduction

- Building out **new team** under new Chief Housing Officer Nicole Heyman to finalize and implement housing action plan
- Managing and deploying federal funds to support the completion of hundreds of new affordable and supportive units over the next year
- Strengthening partnerships to prioritize rapid rehousing of veterans and households with children experiencing homelessness

Public safety

- Investing in the sustainability of our police and fire workforce
- Enhancing youth programming to help prevent violence
- Continuing violence interruption efforts with partners and the community
- Utilizing new technology to better predict and prevent violence

Roads and Critical Infrastructure

- Fulfilling Mayor Kelly's commitment to invest at least \$40 million over 4
 years for repaving roads
- Prioritizing funding for road construction, sidewalks, and bridges
- Deploying federal funds to improve road safety and traffic signal synchronization
- Management of ongoing sewer and stormwater projects

Early Learning

- Training the next generation of early learning professionals through a new partnership with Hamilton County Schools
- Creating new early learning seats with the deployment of American Rescue Plan funds
- Continuing supplemental pay for Head Start teachers

Economic Development

- Busting blight across the city, creating thousands of good-paying jobs.
- Workforce training to ensure that our residents are prepared for the jobs of the future.
- **Strategic investments** in Chattanooga's ability to serve to compete globally as the worldwide economy pivots toward electrification.
- Leveraging a community benefits lens to ensure that when we attract new employers, existing residents receive significant benefits.
- A heavy focus on **transit and transportation** so that every resident can access all of Chattanooga.

Significant Challenges

Significant Challenges

Rebuilding a post-pandemic workforce

- Maintaining improved pay scales
- Increasing base salaries to attract qualified civilian candidates

Impact of Inflation

 Material costs, construction costs, contracting costs, fuel, utilities

Addressing deferred maintenance

Roads and bridges; parks and pools; community centers

Substantial economic challenges lay ahead, most notably surging prices and costs faced by consumers and businesses. The inflation rate peaked at 9.1 percent during the year, it highest level since 1981.
