Proposal for Hamilton County Schools 2012-2013 School Year Clifton Hills Elementary School

Professional Development Goals:

- Support teachers and administrators through customized and sustained on-site, embedded professional development and coaching
- · Help create learning communities for improving teaching and learning

The Professional Development Plan:

Hamilton County has a history of working to provide teachers with strong professional development. Based on current data and discussion with building administrators, there is a need for teachers at Clifton Hills Elementary School to receive systematic and explicit professional development to further extend their knowledge of effective instruction for all students, especially those who are reading below grade level. Teachers will be able to modify and adapt instruction in ways that preserve the integrity of adopted school literacy approaches and build more focused instructional skills to increase students' achievement in all content classes and on standardized tests.

Training will be based on the latest research and recommendations on sustaining literacy development for all students. Strategies and activities presented are designed to work within the context of the schools' adopted texts and curriculum rather than requiring new materials.

As a follow-up to the traditional group-based professional development provided in the 2012-2013 school year, there will be on-site coaching as an integral part of building teacher capacity. Instructional coaching is designed to meet the needs of teachers who want to see effective instructional practices in the context of their own classrooms and school. This approach, which involves a cycle of collaborative planning, model teaching, observations, and feedback, provides contextualized professional development for teachers at all grade levels.

Proposed Dates: 11 days throughout the school year

August 9, 2012: Classroom Management with the Brain in Mind

September 5, 2012: Building visit to observe teachers

September 26-27, 2012: Reading: focus on comprehension strategies

October 5, 2012: Develop literacy plan for the next three quarters

November 14, 2012: Model lessons in teacher classrooms

January 7, 2013: Reading: focus on academic vocabulary strategies

February 6, 2013: Observe teachers using strategies from the modeled lessons
March 19, 2013: Literacy training to be determined based on teacher needs
April 3, 2013: Meet with each grade level to plan 2013-14 school year
May 1, 2013: Meet with administrative team half day and work with

faculty half day.
