Dunlap is located in the heart of the Sequatchie Valley, one of the most picturesque regions in Tennessee and known as the Hang Gliding Capital of the East. Visit Dunlap Coke Ovens Park to learn more about the history of the area, and then enjoy exploring historic downtown Dunlap, our local shops and restaurants, and the natural beauty that makes the Sequatchie Valley such a prized landscape.

Dunlap Coke Ovens Museum & Park (1902)

Remnants of a coke production facility featuring 268 beehive ovens, which operated under various companies until the early 1920s. The park includes a museum and park with picnic tables along Coops Creek. In 1838, hundreds of Cherokee people passed through the park area along Hill Road during the tragic Cherokee Removal. The ovens were placed on the National Historical Register in 1985.

Bikeways of the Scenic South

Road cycling routes in the Sequatchie Valley feature downloadable maps through Ride With GPS. Each October, cyclists come to Dunlap for the Cycle Sequatchie Century Ride & 3 Mtn. Challenge. To learn more visit ScenicBikeways.com and CycleSequatchie.com.

Coops Creek Greenway

The 2-mile (round trip) greenway begins at Harris Park in historic downtown Dunlap and follows along Coops Creek, crosses TN-127 at the Sonic, and continues to the Sequatchie County Schools and Veterans' Park.

Sequatchie River Blueway

The Sequatchie River begins at Cumberland Trail State Park above Pikeville and winds 116 miles through the valley until reaching the Tennessee River near South Pittsburg. A public access point on the river is located at 751 Old York Hwy. in Dunlap. For more info about paddling, go to VisitSequatchieValley.com.

Coops Creek Commons

Coops Creek Commons is a vibrant community green space and multi-use urban park that provides recreation, sports venues and civic activities for residents and visitors to Dunlap. The Commons is also home to the massive annual ValleyFest Festival.
